Subject: Federal Lands: Land Management Agencies' Wildfire Suppression Expenditures

Each year, wildfires on federal lands consume millions of acres of forests, and the federal land management agencies expend hundreds of millions of dollars on wildfire preparedness and suppression activities. On December 18, 1997, we reported to you on the wildfire preparedness activities at five federal land management agencies: the Forest Service within the Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of Land Management, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the Fish and Wildlife Service within the Department of the Interior. You subsequently asked us to provide similar information on these agencies' wildfire suppression expenditures. Specifically, this report provides information on (1) the total amount of money the land management agencies expended on federal wildfire suppression during fiscal years 1993 through 1997 and (2) the major categories of wildfire suppression expenditures.

While wildfire preparedness activities include those actions undertaken prior to the actual onset of a wildfire, suppression operations include actions taken to put out wildfires, including the use of firefighting personnel and equipment.

Suppression activities also include emergency rehabilitation following a wildfire. Various rehabilitation actions are carried out to prevent land degradation, resource losses, soil erosion, or other conditions or damage caused by wildfires.

In summary, during fiscal years 1993 through 1997, the federal land management agencies expended about \$2.3 billion on wildfire suppression. Included in these expenditures was about \$1.2 billion for services and supplies;² \$941 million for personnel costs; \$74 million for travel; and \$50 million for rents, communications and utilities.

As discussed in the "Scope and Methodology" section at the end of this report, the financial data presented here were provided to us by the land management agencies for the most recent 5-year period. We did not independently verify the reliability of the financial data provided nor did we trace the data to the systems from which they came. These systems were, in some cases, subject to audits by the Office of Inspector General in connection with the agencies' financial statement audits, which showed weaknesses in the data. Despite these weaknesses, we used the data because they were the only data available and are the data the agencies use to manage their programs.

FUNDS EXPENDED BY THE LAND MANAGEMENT AGENCIES ON WILDFIRE SUPPRESSION EXPENDITURES

Expenditure categories for wildfire suppression are similar to those for wildfire preparedness activities. For both activities, the largest expenditures were for services and supplies and personnel costs. While preparedness expenditures were relatively stable during the reporting period because, by their nature, they can be planned, suppression expenditures varied greatly because they were directly related to the number and intensity of wildfires in a given year. For example, in fiscal year 1996 about 20,000 wildfires burned almost 4 million acres, resulting in large expenditures for personnel, services and supplies, and travel. Conversely, expenditures in these categories declined in fiscal year 1997 when about 14,000 wildfires consumed about 2 million acres.

Table 1 shows each land management agency's total wildfire suppression expenditures for fiscal years 1993 through 1997. Tables 2 through 9 present

detailed information on the types of wildfire suppression activities funded by the land management agencies for this period.

AGENCY COMMENTS

We provided copies of a draft of this report to the Department of the Interior, the Bureau of Land Management, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Forest Service. The Forest Service and the Department of the Interior, which commented for its subagencies, concurred with the factual content and provided technical clarifications, which we incorporated into the report.

SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

To respond to this request, we obtained financial data from the land management agencies for the most recent 5-year period-fiscal years 1993 through 1997. We obtained financial and other data from the headquarters office of the Forest Service and from the Department of the Interior's staff at the National Interagency Fire Center in Boise, Idaho.³ The financial information that we obtained was national in scope.

We did not independently verify the reliability of the financial data provided nor did we trace the data to the systems from which they came. These systems were, in some cases, subject to audit procedures by the Office of Inspector General in connection with the agencies' financial statement audits. For fiscal years 1993 through 1995, the Department of Agriculture's Office of Inspector General reported that because of significant internal control weaknesses in various accounting subsystems, the Forest Service's accounting data were not reliable. Furthermore, for fiscal year 1996, the Department of the Interior's Office of Inspector General reported certain weaknesses in the internal controls at Interior's administrative service centers.⁴ These centers provide a majority of the Department's financial information through automated systems. Despite these weaknesses, we used the data because they were the only data available and are the data the agencies use to manage their programs. We performed our work from January through March 1998 in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards.

We are sending copies of this report to the Secretaries of Agriculture and the Interior as well as to the Chief of the Forest Service and the Directors of the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and Fish and Wildlife Service. 
